ADDRESS.

Dear Madam,

As the period is close at hand when our District and its neighbourhood can no longer be the sphere of that usefulness, that energy, and faithful discharge of Christian duty which have endeared you to us, we desire ere it arrives and you are removed from among us, to convey to you our united expression of warm and affectionate regard—feelings which have been called forth by the uniform kindness and untiring zeal that have distinguished your exertions for our welfare, rendering our intercourse at all times so pleasing and so harmonious.

The tie which exists between us being one of attachment formed by long connection, and also, we hope, spiritual in its nature, is therefore one of the happiest description; we trust this tie may remain not only unbroken but strengthened—to draw nearer to our Redeemer whereby we draw nearer to one another was the first object of our intercourse here, and this we desire may ever be our aim till we congratulate each other in an Eternal meeting.

At the departure from among us of so valued and so devoted a friend, sentiments of sorrow arise in our hearts—our children too in whose instruction you have assisted—the poor who have likewise enjoyed your liberality—the sick who have been cheered by your sympathising kindness, with us lament the separation; but the Event which leads to your removal, affords us also, on your account, grounds for congratulation and Christian rejoicing, and forbids us to give further utterance to personal regret.

The accompanying mark of our warm regard will but very inadequately perpetuate the unanimous sentiment which pervades our hearts, we hope you will receive it as a token, that your worth and generous services have not been unappreciated by us; and with our united assurance, that we, with whom you have so often prayed, will not at this time fail to make mention of you in our prayers, and to implore the Divine Blessing upon the future Partner of your happiness as well as upon yourself.

My dear Friends,

The truly kind and Christian expressions of regard which you have conveyed to me, are indeed deeply gratifying to my feelings, yet, I confess, some pain is mingled with my pleasure while I receive them, which originates in a consciousness that your affection towards me has led you to estimate far too highly my humble efforts to be of use among you; for tho' my heart does indeed bear testimony to the sincerity of my love towards you, I know full well that my regard for your eternal welfare, ought to have produced more constant and self denying efforts.

To the Master and Mistress of my School, while I take this opportunity of gratefully thanking them for the assistance they have thus far rendered me, I would say “Be not weary in well doing, for in due season ye shall reap if ye faint not.”

And now my dear Friends I must offer you my sincere and cordial thanks for the kind token of remembrance—your beautiful and elegant present will be deeply valued, and will often remind me of you and bring to my heart the cheering hope, that tho' absent I am not forgotten nor prevented meeting you in spirit in the presence of Him who is the blessed centre of all true happiness.

Most affectionately do I thank you for blending with mine, the name of one who is now so dear to me, in petitions which we greatly need and highly prize; and while we entreat a continued interest in *your* prayers, let me assure you, you will not be unremembered *in ours*.

With the repeated assurance of my unceasing interest in your temporal and spiritual welfare, I now “commend you unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His Glory.”

Holy Trinity Church, Woodbury-Salterton.

The parish of Woodbury Salterton lies between the Exeter-Sidmouth, and the Exeter-Woodbury roads. It was originally an outlying part of the two parishes of Woodbury and Colaton Raleigh.

Previous to 1844 Miss Marianne Pidsley, of Greendale, seeing the utterly neglected state of Woodbury Salterton was advised by the Rev. Aaron Pecke of Kingskerswell (her Spiritual Father) to open a school which she did in a cottage ^{where Mrs. Burford now lives} at first with one schoolmistress. The cottage proved too small. A site was then procured and preparations made to build a school. The first Master was John Walling at the age of 18 years. It soon became obvious also that a church was needed. At that time 130 children were being taken to Woodbury twice every Sunday - a heavy task in all weathers.

And so the site intended for the new school was used as a site for the church. A small orchard adjoining was purchased as a churchyard. Bishop Phillpotts of Exeter came to view the site, and his approval given the work was begun.

The old tithe barn was bought from the Priest Vicars of Exeter Cathedral; and most of the farmers of the parish assisted in hauling the materials free of cost. Most of the stone was procured at Exmouth, being quarried at low water, taken to Lymestone and then to the site.

While the church was being built robins made their nest

in the chancel and saved their young. To commemorate this, Mr. Stevens, a London sculptor, sent the two bosses of the chancel arch. The letters in the windows came from Westminster Abbey. The School Master's Wife worked the fine back of the Bishop's Chair.

It is of interest to note that when the church was in building, the old Exeter prison was being demolished. The lock and key of the prison door were procured by Miss Pidsley and are on the south door of the church. It will be noticed that the door can be locked on the outside only.

The parish Church of Woodbury Sallerton dedicated to honour the Holy Trinity, was consecrated on 24th September 1844, by Bishop Henry Phillpotts of Exeter.

Miss Marianne Pidsley who did so much for the spiritual, moral, and physical well-being of the village, died on 21st September 1847. The new school which she had so much at heart was built and endowed by her in the same year.

Many improvements have been made from time to time to beautify the church. During the incumbency of Rev. H. P. Alford (1882-1903) the altar was raised on two marble steps, and the carved panels and cornice behind the altar were installed.

The present Bible and Lectern were placed in the church, and the introduction of lamps made evening

services possible. The beautiful East Window was given by Lady Dunbayne in memory of her husband Lord Dunbayne.

In 1884 a new organ was built at a cost of £120.

The first Confirmation held in the Church was in 1884 during the episcopate of Bishop Temple.

In September 1909 a new addition to the churchyard was consecrated by the Bishop of Exeter (Dr Robertson). The following spring the Bishop again visited the parish, and dedicated the parish Room, which was given by Lady Dunbayne of Greendale.

As a memorial to the two men who gave their lives in the Great War 19-14 to 1918, and as a thanksgiving to the 47 who returned, the Lych Gate at the south entrance of the churchyard was erected and dedicated in 1920.

In 1925 the choir stalls and organ were removed from the gallery to the chancel. This work was done by the Hon. Mrs Peters in memory of her mother, Lady Dunbayne who died in 1919.

Electric Light was installed in the Church and parish Room in 1937

The Lymn board was presented by Major Morrison-Bell in 1909.

The Altar book rest and the oak Sanctuary Chair were given in 1890.

The small Challice and paten was given in 1937.

The Vestments were presented in 1944.
