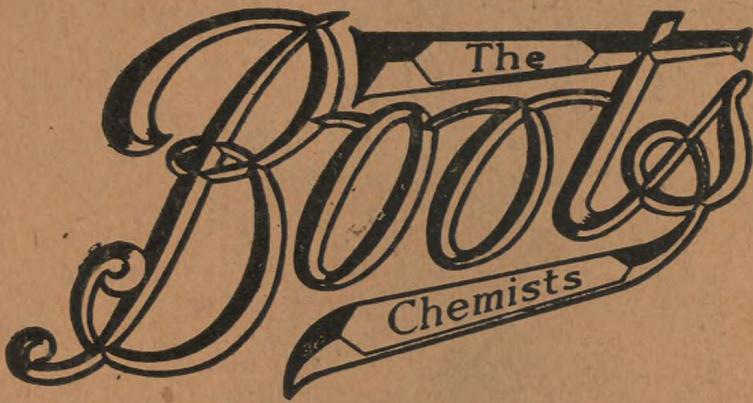

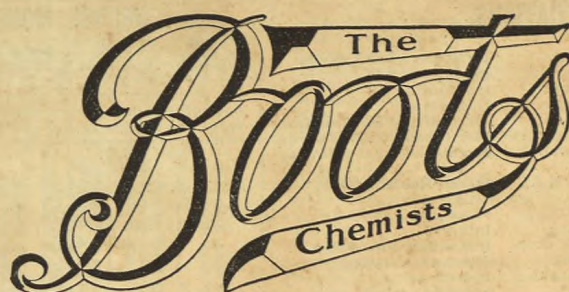

BILLS OF EXCHANGE.

These differ from Promissory Notes in several important particulars. A Bill of Exchange is an unconditional order by a person (the drawer) upon another person (the drawee) to pay a sum of money at a certain time or on demand. To bind the drawee it must be accepted by him. Liability for payment rests first with the drawer, or, failing him, the drawer. It must be stamped according to the amount concerned. "Days of grace" are the same as for Promissory Notes.

Sample Bill of Exchange for £100, dated Nottingham Jan 7th 1906, payable to the order of ourselves, with a stamp and signature of John Jones & Co.

Note.—Should a Promissory Note or Bill of Exchange fall due on a Bank Holiday, it is payable the day after; or on Sunday, Good Friday or Christmas Day, then the day previous.

AFFIDAVITS.—An Affidavit or Statutory Declaration must be stamped with a half-crown stamp.

DOG TAX.—Payable by owner of any dog of the minimum age of six months. 7/6. Dogs under six months are not liable. Dog licences expire on Dec. 31st. Penalty for keeping a dog without a licence, £5.

Dogs used solely by blind persons are exempt, and farmers and shepherds may obtain exemption on making the necessary declaration.

Gifts within three years of the testator's death are liable to duty.

Where the net value of the property, real and personal, does not exceed £1,000, Estate Duty only is payable, and the property is exempt from Legacy and Succession Duty.

Small estates up to £300 and £500 gross may be charged with fixed duties of 30s. and 50s., and are exempt from all other death duties.

GUN LICENCES.—Payment is rigidly enforced, even to carrying revolver or air gun. Soldiers, volunteers, and holders of game licences are exempt. Expire 31st July. Gun or Pistol, 10s.

An annual licence for killing game, expiring July 31st, costs £3; for 14 days only, 20s. A short period licence from Aug. 1st to Oct. 31st, or from Nov. 1st to July 31st, costs £2. A gamekeeper's licence costs £2, and any one having the right to kill game in England or Scotland can take an annual licence out for any assessed servant to act as a gamekeeper for the same sum. Such licences expire July 31st.

LEGACY DUTY.—Legacy Duty is payable on all legacies willed by a deceased person, on the following scale:—To children of the deceased, or their descendants, or to the father or mother or other lineal ancestor of the deceased, £1 per cent.; to brothers and sisters of the deceased, or their descendants, £5 per cent.; to more remote relations strangers or charities, £10 per cent. But legacy duty is not payable on legacies to spouse or children when the estate is under £15,000, or if fixed estate duty has been paid on estates under £1,000, otherwise a husband or wife is chargeable with estate duty and legacy and succession duty.

LETTERS OF ALLOTMENT AND OF RENUNCIATION.—Amount less than £5, Stamp Duty, 1d.; £5 or upwards, Stamp Duty, 6d.

SETTLEMENT. Any deed whereby any definite sum, or stock, or security is settled or agreed to be settled in any manner: for every £100 or part of £100, 5s.

INVESTMENTS AND INTEREST.

To find the price at which £100 stock (bearing a definite interest) must be bought to yield a given amount of interest, multiply the price of the stock by the figures representing the interest it bears, and divide by those representing the interest desired, thus:—

CALCULATION OF INTEREST.

You lend a man £93 at 5% for 21 days What interest are you entitled to?

5% = 1/- in the £1 (12 pence in the £1); 12 pence for 12 months equals one penny per month; three weeks equals three-fourths of a month. You are entitled to 93/- (one shilling in the £1) for a full year, or 93 pence for a month; therefore, 3/4 of 93 pence will give the answer (69½).

This method is only approximately correct, as three weeks is not exactly three-fourths of a month.

To ascertain more accurately, the amount due on a given sum for a definite number of days at a stated interest, say £75 for 73 days at 5%, first

find the amount due on the sum for 12 months by multiplying the amount by the rate of interest and dividing by 100, e.g.:—

ESTIMATING PROFITS.

It is generally agreed that mistakes are likely to arise unless profit is based on the "returns." It is quite a debatable point on some lines, such as selling of stocks and shares as to whether the percentage of profit should be calculated from cost or selling price, but for tradesmen there should be only one rule, and that is, all profit should be calculated on returns.

For instance, say goods are bought for £75 and sold for £100. Of this, £25 (or 25%) is profit, and could be banked, leaving the outlay or principal (£75) intact. But if one considered that a profit of 33½% had been made, and were £33 6s. 8d. banked, the principal would be reduced to £66 13s. 4d. When calculating the rate of profit, the principal must remain intact. In some trades it is the custom to calculate profit on the cost price. In many other trades it is the custom to calculate profit on the selling price, and when such a question arises it should be made very clear as to whether calculation is based "on cost," or "on returns."

The following is an easy method of calculating profits:—

3 added to the cost price will give—
50% on cost or 33½% on returns

The above remarks apply more directly to the retailing of goods than to property, shares, etc.

STAMPS.

Stamps are issued at following values: $\frac{1}{2}$ d., 1d., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., 2d., $2\frac{1}{2}$ d., 3d., 4d., 5d., 6d., 9d., 10d., 1/-, 2/6, 5/- and 10/-
Books containing eighteen $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., six 1d. and six $\frac{1}{2}$ d. stamps are now on sale at each post office. Price 3/-
Books containing ten $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., six 1d., and six $\frac{1}{2}$ d. stamps, price 2/-

LETTER POST.

The prepaid rate of postage is as follows:

2-oz. in weight $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.
Each additional 2-oz. or fraction $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

A letter posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage; a letter insufficiently paid, with double the deficiency. No letter may exceed two feet in length, one foot in width, or one foot in depth. Weight unlimited.

LETTERS TO H.M. SHIPS IN HOME WATERS.

REGISTRATION.

Any letter, parcel, or other postal packet may be registered. The minimum fee is 3d., in addition to the postage. Registered correspondence, on being redirected, may not be dropped into a letter box, but must be taken to a Post Office to be dealt with as registered.

CERTIFICATES OF POSTING CORRESPONDENCE.

Any person who desires proof that unregistered correspondence has been posted should hand in the correspondence at a Post Office, and ask for a certificate of posting. The fee is one halfpenny payable by a stamp which must be affixed by the sender to the form of certificate.

POST-CARDS.

The prepaid rate of postage on every post-card is 1d., and on every reply post-card 2d. A post-card posted unpaid is chargeable on delivery with double postage: if posted underpaid, with double the deficiency.

Picture Post-cards containing not more than five complimentary words may be sent for $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Cards used as post-cards must be made of ordinary card-board, not thinner than the material used for the thinnest official post-card. They may not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches in length, by $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches in width, or be less than 4 inches in length by $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches in width.

A gummed label (not to exceed 2 inches long and $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch wide) bearing the name and address of the sender may be affixed to the card. If any of the rules relating to a post-card be infringed, the card will be treated as a letter.

INLAND PRINTED PAPER POST.

This rate may be used for forwarding books, written or printed matter not in the nature of a letter, sketches, photographs, maps, certificates, estimates, deeds, circulars, Christmas cards, &c.

Not exceeding 6-oz., 1d., with $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every additional 6-oz. or fraction of 6-oz. This applies to single copies only. Two or more copies liable to same postage as if posted separately. Limit of weight for each packet, 2-lb.

LETTER CARDS.

Bearing $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. stamp—1 for 2d.; 6 for 11d.; 10 for 1/6.

BLIND LITERATURE (INLAND).

Up to 2-lb. $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; 5-lb. 1d.; $6\frac{1}{2}$ -lb. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

PARCEL POST.

No parcel may exceed 11-lb. in weight.

The size allowed for an inland parcel is:

For example—A parcel measuring 3-ft. 6-in. in its longest dimensions may measure as much as 2-ft. 6-in. round its thickest part; or a short parcel may be thicker: thus, if it measure no more than 3-ft. in length, it may measure as much as 3-ft. round its thickest part.

The postage on a parcel must be prepaid. Mark each parcel "Parcel Post." A parcel must not be posted in a letter box, but presented at the counter of a post office, and the sender should see that the weight, size and postage are in order before leaving.

RE-DIRECTION OF PARCELS.

Parcels are, when re-directed, liable to additional postage at the prepaid rate for each re-direction, except where the original and the second address are either served from the same delivery office or are within the same town delivery area, and the re-direction is made within the period of free re-direction allowed for letters. A parcel will not, however, be delivered free of charge to a person who has previously refused to accept it, and for re-direction from a Returned Letter Office a second postage is invariably charged.

PARCELS (IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN).

Parcels are accepted for parcel post to most foreign countries under conditions similar to the inland regulations *except* that for customs requirements the contents must be declared. The customs charges of certain countries can be prepaid by sender on depositing one-fifth to one-third of declared value, otherwise they are collected from addressee. The postage varies to different countries and must be prepaid. Insurance fee is 5d. for first £12, 2d. for each additional £12, up to 5/11 for £400.

MONEY ORDERS (INLAND).

The postal authorities cannot issue a single money order for more than £40, and will only cash them at the money order office at which they are made payable, unless they are crossed, when they can be paid through a bank. No fractional part of a 1d. can be contained in a money order.

MONEY ORDERS (INLAND, IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN).

Poundage at same rate as for Ordinary Imperial and Foreign Money Orders, plus fee of 6d. or 1/-, and cost of Telegram of Advice.

POSTAL ORDERS.

Issued and paid at all Post Offices in the British Islands (with some exceptions), and in many British Possessions and places abroad. If crossed must be paid through a bank.

Before parting with a postal order, always fill in the name of the person to whom the amount is to be paid. Each order is numbered, as is also the counterfoil attached, which latter should be retained and name of payee filled in. The Postmaster-General will entertain no further claim after an order is once paid. Stamps to the amount of 5d., but not more than three in number can be affixed to make up odd sums.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK.

In every town and in almost every village throughout Great Britain and Northern Ireland small savings may be paid in at the Post Office. No person can have more than one account. Amounts placed in the bank on behalf of children under seven years of age cannot be withdrawn until the child reaches that age, and then only under his or her own signature. Each depositor receives a bank book in which the amount of each deposit should be entered at the time of paying in. Any sum from a shilling upwards may be deposited. If the deposit is £20 or over, a special acknowledgment is sent from the head London office. Interest is allowed at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Any amount not exceeding £1 may be withdrawn without previous notice, on presenting the bank book. The bank book should be sent each year, postage free, on the anniversary of the date when the account was opened, to the Controller of the Savings Bank Department for purposes of checking and adding interest. The withdrawal of money up to £10 can be expedited by telegraphing, the depositor paying cost of telegrams and a service charge of one shilling.

COMMUNICATION BY WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY WITH SHIPS AT SEA.

Private radio-telegrams for transmission to or from ships of most nationalities, including British, through coast stations in the United Kingdom, are usually charged 11d. per word. There are special long-distance services with certain ocean liners through the Devizes Government station (range about 1500 m.) at a total charge of 11d. per word, and through the Government high power station at Rugby (range worldwide), inclusive charge 1s. 6d. a word.

INSURED BOX POST.

Articles of gold and silver, precious stones, jewellery, and other articles of a similar nature, which are prohibited from transmission in insured letters may now be sent in the letter mails to certain countries as "Insured Boxes." Certain articles are prohibited, such as current coin, letters or correspondence, bank notes, securities, etc. An insured box must not exceed 2-lb. in weight, and must not measure more than 12 inches in length, 4 inches in breadth, and 4 inches in depth. The boxes must be strongly made of metal or wood. The postage is 2d. for 2-oz., with minimum of 10d. The maximum limit of insurance is £400. There are special directions for packing and labelling. Customs declarations must be filled in.

CASH ON DELIVERY.

Arrangements have been made whereby senders of articles by parcel post between Great Britain and Northern Ireland and certain British possessions and other places abroad can have the value collected on delivery, and same remitted by special card money order. The "Trade Charge" *i.e.*, the amount to be collected must not exceed £40.

CASH ON DELIVERY (INLAND).

Parcels may also be posted at any Money Order Post Office for delivery at any address in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and the value collected as above. The fees, which are additional to the ordinary parcel postage are as follows:—For trade charge not exceeding 10s., 4d.; £1, 6d.; £2, 8d.; £5, 10d.; £10, 1s., and 2d. for each additional £5 or fraction of £5 up to the maximum of £40.

IMPERIAL AND FOREIGN CORRESPONDENCE.

To British possessions generally, Egypt, Palestine, United States of America, the British Post Office at Tangier, H.M. Ships in Foreign waters and the Army of the Rhine, 1½d. for the first oz. and 1d. each succeeding oz.

To all other places including Iraq, 2½d. for the first oz., and 1½d. for each succeeding oz. or fraction.

TELEGRAPHS.

The Postmaster-General's telegraphs are open to the public for communication to all parts of Great Britain and Ireland, to places abroad, and to ships at sea.

The charge for an "Inland" telegram is independent of distance, and depends upon the number of words only.

The Imperial and Foreign telegraph system and the Radio-telegraphic system are largely regulated by International Conventions, to which nearly all countries are parties.

Telegraph offices are usually open on week-days from 8 a.m. to 7.30 or 8 p.m., but in London and a few of the largest provincial towns, the Head Office is always open, day and night, and in many towns telegrams may be despatched at any hour from the railway station.

INLAND TELEGRAMS.

The charge is 1/- for the first twelve words including the address, and 1d. for every additional word. Telegrams handed in on Sundays, Good Friday, and Christmas Day charged 6d. extra. In Scotland 6d. extra on Sundays only.

Telegrams can be repeated on payment of half the original charge, which extra payment is refunded if error is detected. Telegrams may be posted in wall or pillar boxes, or handed to rural postmen, and are wired as soon as received at the nearest telegraph office. Late fees secure attention, in certain cases, to telegrams handed in after the usual hours. The cost of registering an abbreviated address, which must consist of two words, is £2 a year.

Telegrams in plain language in any modern European tongue or in Latin or in Esperanto are charged for according to the number of words; but all words not forming part of any modern European language, or of Latin, or of Esperanto, and all unintelligible combinations of letters are charged for at the rate of five letters to a word in the text, and as one word each when used in the address.

Exceptions—Words which are ordinarily written as one, or coupled by hyphens, as "mother-in-law," "forty-seven," "warehouseman" are counted as one word.

Such names as O'Neil, MacDonald, De la Rue, and names with the prefix "St." as St. Pancras, are charged for as single words, but double names like Bouverie-Tracy, although written with a hyphen, count as two words.

Such abbreviations as "can't," "won't," "couldn't," are counted as single words.

Figures are counted at the rate of five figures to a word. For example: "38563" counts as one word, while "385634" counts as two words.

Names such as "Newcastle-on-Tyne," "Abbey-Holme" and "Bodmin Road" are counted as one word, but "Hanging Ditch" and "Drury Lane" are each counted as two words.

When it is necessary to add the name of a county to the name of a place to distinguish it from another place of the same name, *e.g.*, Egremont (Ches.), the name of the county is not charged for.

When words are underlined, or placed in parentheses, or within inverted commas, one extra word is charged for.

One word each is also charged for the ordinary signs of punctuation if they are required to be transmitted.

When the address is beyond the limit of free delivery, portorage is charged at the rate of 6d. per mile or part of a mile, the distance being calculated from the limit of free delivery.

MIXED POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

A telegram can now be forwarded partly by telegraph and partly by post. For example:—"Poste Smith, 10 Broad Street, Calcutta, Marseilles." This could be telegraphed to Marseilles to catch the outgoing mail, and then forwarded on by post to its destination. For charges, enquire at any Telegraph Office.

Telegrams may also be sent to the despatching offices at Dover, Lewes, Liverpool, London (foreign section), Newcastle-on-Tyne and Southampton for onward transmission as letters in the outgoing mails.
