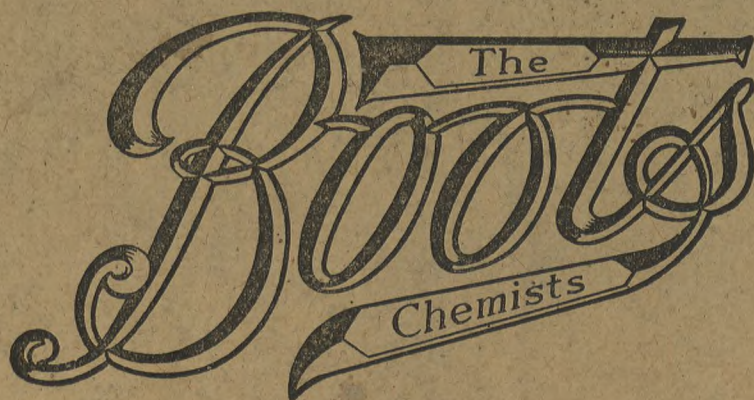

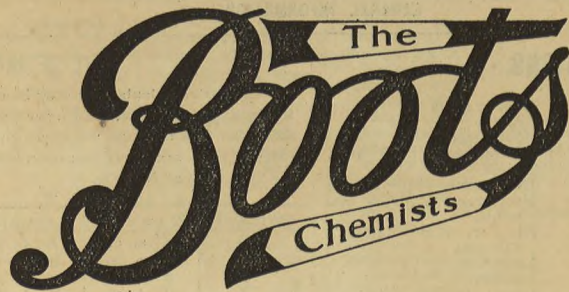

**ESTIMATING PROFITS.**

It is generally agreed that mistakes are likely to arise unless profit is based on the "returns." It is quite a debatable point on some lines, such as selling of stocks and shares as to whether the percentage of profit should be calculated from cost or selling price, but for tradesmen there should be only one rule, and that is, all profit should be calculated on returns.

For instance, say goods are bought for £75 and sold for £100. Or this, £25 (or 25%) is profit, and could be banked, leaving the outlay or principal (£75) intact. But if one considered that a profit of 33½% had been made, and were £33 6s. 8d. banked, the principal would be reduced to £66 13s. 4d. When calculating the rate of profit, the principal must remain intact. In some trades it is the custom to calculate profit on the selling price, and when such a question arises it should be made very clear as to whether calculation is based "on cost," or "on returns."

The following is an easy method of calculating profits:—  
½ added to the cost price will give—

3rd	33½%	25%
4th	25%	20%
5th	20%	16½%
6th	16½%	14½%
7th	14½%	12½%
8th	12½%	11½%
10th	10%	9½%

The above remarks apply more directly to the retailing of goods than to property, shares, etc.

TELEGRAPHS.

Telegraph offices are usually open on week-days from 8 a.m. to 7.30 or 8 p.m., but in London and a few of the largest provincial towns, the Head Office is always open, day and night, and in many towns telegrams may be despatched at any hour from the railway station.

INLAND TELEGRAMS.

The charge is 1/- (to the Irish Free State, 1/6) for the first two words including the address, and 1d. for every additional word. Telegrams handed in on Sundays, Good Friday, and Christmas Day charged 6d. extra. In Scotland 6d. extra on Sundays only.

Telegrams can be repeated on payment of half the original charge. If the receiver of a telegram doubts its accuracy, he may have the whole or any part of it repeated without charge, so long as the original telegram is on hand at the office of origin. Telegrams may be posted in wall or pillar boxes, or handed to rural postmen, and are wired as soon as received at the nearest telegraph office. Late fees secure attention, in certain cases, to telegrams handed in after the usual hours. The cost of registering an abbreviated address, which must consist of two words, is £2 a year.

Telegrams in plain language in any modern European tongue or in Latin or in Esperanto are charged for according to the number of words; but all words not forming part of any modern European language, or of Latin, or of Esperanto, and all unintelligible combinations of letters are charged for at the rate of five letters to a word in the text, and as one word each when used in the address.

Exceptions—Words which are ordinarily written as one, or coupled by hyphens, as “mother-in-law,” “forty-seven,” “warehouseman,” are counted as one word.

Names like MacDonald, Fitzgerald, O’Neil, De Morgan, De la Rue, St. John are counted as one word each, and any compound name which is ordinarily joined together by a hyphen or hyphens is also counted as one word, e.g., Bouverie-Tracy, Cave-Brown-Cave. Compound names not ordinarily joined by a hyphen, e.g., Lloyd George and all other combinations of names are counted according to the number of separate words or names contained in them.

Such abbreviations as “can’t,” “won’t,” “couldn’t,” are counted as single words.

Figures are counted at the rate of five figures to a word. For example: “38563” counts as one word, while “385634” counts as two words.

Names such as “Newcastle-on-Tyne,” “Abbey-Holme” and “Bodmin Road,” are counted as one word, but “Hanging Ditch” and “Drury Lane” are each counted as two words.

When it is necessary to add the name of a county to the name of a place to distinguish it from another place of the same name, e.g., Egremont (Ches.), the name of the county is not charged for. When words are underlined, or placed in parentheses, or within inverted commas, one extra word is charged for.

One word each is also charged for the ordinary signs of punctuation if they are required to be transmitted.

When the address is beyond the limit of free delivery (three miles) portorage is charged at the rate of 6d. per mile or part of a mile, the distance being calculated from the limit of free delivery.

MIXED POSTAL AND TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

A telegram can now be forwarded partly by telegraph and partly by post. For example:—“Post Smith, 10 Broad Street, Calcutta, Marseilles.” This could be telegraphed to Marseilles to catch the outgoing mail, and then forwarded on by post to its destination. For charges, enquire at any Telegraph Office.

Telegrams may also be sent to the despatching offices at Dover, Lewes, Liverpool, London (foreign section), Newcastle-on-Tyne and Southampton for onward transmission as letters in the outgoing mails.

TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMBINED DELIVERY.

Telephone subscribers’ circuits and public telephone call offices may be used for the dictation of messages to telegraphic offices for onward transmission as telegrams subject to certain conditions.

Telegrams may also be delivered to telephone subscribers by telephone, and may be addressed to subscribers’ telephonic addresses.

TELEPHONED LETTERS.

Subscribers may use telephone for sending express, air mail or ordinary letters. Rate—30 words, 3d. and 1d. for every 10 words over 30; plus postage for ordinary and air letters and usual express fee for express letters. Call fee additional.

TRUNK TELEPHONE RATES.

Between 7 a.m. and 2 p.m. for 3 minutes, the charges to subscribers and non-subscribers are: from 7½ to 10 miles, 3d.; 10-12½, 4d.; 12½-15, 5d.; 15-20, 7d.; 20-25, 9d.; increasing to 5s. 6d. for 350 miles; for each 100 miles or part over 350, 1s. The rates are lower between 2 p.m. and 7 p.m., and still lower between 7 p.m. and 7 a.m. (for 6 minutes up to 10 miles). Call office fee payable in each case. From places in Great Britain and Northern Ireland to the Irish Free State the charges are higher than the above beyond 200 miles.

AIR MAIL SERVICES.

The rate of postage (including ordinary postage) to European countries is 4d. for the first oz. and 3d. each additional oz. The Indian Air Mail leaves Saturdays; the South African, Wednesdays. Air Mail Letter Boxes are provided. See P.O. Leaflets.

NIGHT TELEGRAPH LETTER SERVICE.

Telegrams for delivery by post early the next morning may be sent between certain towns. Rate: 36 words, 1s.; and 1d. for every additional 3 words.

GOLD.

Gold, if of or above the least current weight, is legal tender to any amount. Standard Gold contains twenty-two twenty-fourths (carats) of fine gold and two twenty-fourths of alloy.

SILVER AND BRONZE.

STANDARD SILVER formerly contained thirty-seven fortieths of fine silver and three fortieths of alloy: millesimal fineness, 925. But by an amending Act (Coinage Act, 1920) silver for coinage now contains half silver, half alloy: millesimal fineness, 500. Silver is not a legal tender for sums over two pounds, nor bronze, for sums over one shilling. The melting of British gold and silver coin is prohibited.

CHANGE.

Change cannot be demanded except from the Bank of England.

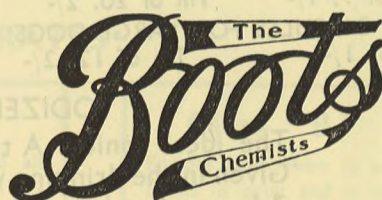

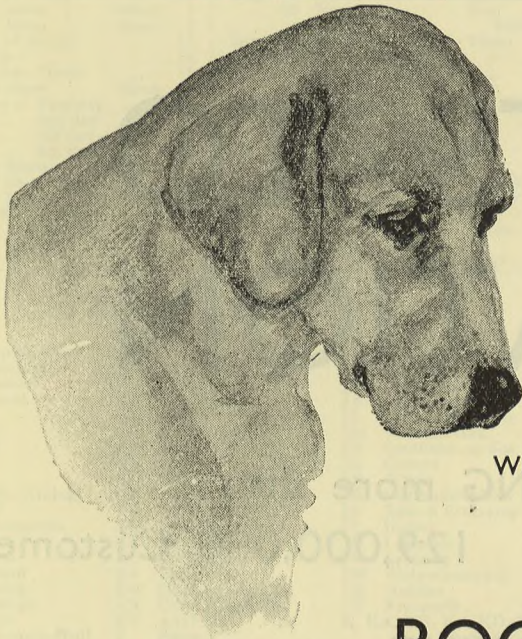

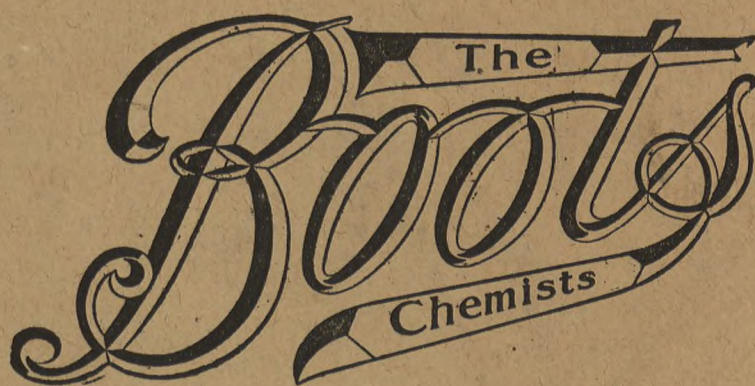
