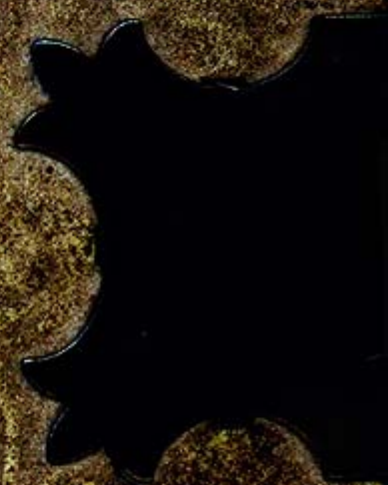

and all the ^{Hay} was saved in good order
in August it rained all most

in the Country was melted
