Beer first make your  
water Boil season it  
with Cold water until  
you can see your face  
an eye an nails in the  
water then Mash let it  
lay 3 or half hours on  
before Drawing of the  
first Beer then Mash again  
with the Boiling water  
you can get the first  
beer to Boil 3 hours or  
half an all of it the same  
put the hops into the Beer  
Dry as soon as you begin



To Boil it put <sup>lbs</sup> 1 1/2 of  
hops to 2 Bushels of  
Malt put a pint of  
yeast to a half Hoghead  
of Beer put the yeast  
into it with warm  
to work it

every Day or Night all  
through out the month  
of June a great many  
floods during the month  
all meadows flooded  
J Wilson

1858 Feb 20 finished making  
Cider the produce of 1857  
1858 April 10 Mr Thos Pearce  
Quit Frisco's Heathfield and  
gave up possession to Mr Aaron  
Ware of Woodbury Satterton

1857 December was a beautiful  
fine Dry an mild month  
Could sow wheat better to  
Christmas then could to  
Newton peopleford Fair 1857  
January was the same could sow  
wheat all the month through  
I sowed half of the five acres  
the 25<sup>th</sup> of January 1858 I Wilson  
Dry enough to roll when I  
sowed it a great many did  
that sowed the same time  
A fine Dry Summer after it  
an a glorious fine harvest  
an a fine yielding of wheat  
never better but sold it for  
5<sup>d</sup> an 5<sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> per Bushel

1853 Saturday May 7 it was  
a warm an pleasant morning about  
10 O'clock the wind got in to  
the North East it was cold enough  
to kill a snipe it had snowed  
an rained an in the night it was  
a very white frost ice as thick  
as a brown piece after a very  
severe winter 4 months continuously  
flooded 3 weeks the snow cover  
the ground with sharp frosts and  
a great many frosty mornings  
enough to make the stiffer of  
Land work well ~~off~~  
the Cattle Laid in to house  
by the beginning of November  
1852

1853 May the 8 it was a bitter  
Cold Day May 9 it hailed snow  
and rained a Great part of the Day  
and a bitter Cold Day wind  
North West



1856 began Harvest August  
the 4 most brilliant fine  
weather up to the 16 an it  
~~came~~ began to rain an it  
rained every day untill the  
22 one or to very High  
Floods the Greatest part  
of the Corley wheat an oats  
an barley was Down at the  
time 1857 a glorious fine  
harvest as ever was known  
1858 it was a still finer  
one it was without its equal

part of the Day Old  
Christmas Day and  
also Old New Year
