People from the past can soon be forgotten, but we must try and remember them!





















A LIFE down on the farm comes to an end this week for Woodbury's Norman Bowles. Mr Bowles is leaving Woodbury, after 64 years. He moved there from Exeter when he was just two years old. Farm equipment and livestock were sold last week – even the family peacock. He and his wife Patricia, who was born in Woodbury. have been tenant farmers of Clinton Devon Estates and are looking forward to their retirement – not far away in East Budleigh. The long unsociable hours associated with farming have not stopped Mr Bowles from taking an

community. He stood down from Woodbury Parish Council about six years ago, having been a member for about 40 years. He was also a special


constable for 30 years. Mr Bowles has been a school manager at Woodbury Primary School and was a founder member of the Woodbury and District Youth

Farmers' Club. Beef, sheep and cereals — Mr Bowles has had experience of them all, and he can recall getting up every two or three hours in the night to check on his sheep during the lambing season.


A sale held by Husseys of Exeter at Woodmanton last week, drew a large crowd and Mr Bowles said it was good to renew some old acquaintances.

Even the family peacock sold - for C32 -and a top price of C625 was fetched for store cattle.






