A luncheon party was held at an hotel on Sidmouth seafront. As there were 13 of us a soft toy was placed on a chair at the end of the table, provided by the hotel!

Al was in the R.C.A.F. attached to the R.A.F., and I was returning to RAF Branscombe following a six week course at Yatesbury, when we met at Sidmouth Junction station. He was the first and only Canadian at the Radar Station for a year.

Our chosen wedding date clashed with D - Day being imminent and all leave had been cancelled, so special permission for a to get married had to be obtained from Group HQ - who also gave permission for a number of camp radio operators to attend our wedding. They were dropped off at Woodbury from the ration run lorys to Exeter.

We had been told that if D - Day happened we would not be able to get married, and if we were on our honeymoon we would be recalled.

However, it all went ahead and our vicar Dr. JLL. Fulford married us assisted by his curate the Rev Peter Clynick. "Snip" (Edward Ware) my cousin was best man and Heather Alford another cousin was bridesmaid.

The next day at Ilflacombe we met an officer who used to be at RAF Branscombe with us and he told us "Wonderful news, we've inwaded today"! We were afraid to return to our hote in case we would be recalled, but we had five days leave.

Our Diamond wedding anniversary was just perfect and St Swithuns bells rang out. We had some wonderful flower arrangements - including a lovely tub of Paradise patio roses, and we both send our grateful thanks for the masses of cards we received.

The next day, the visiting vicar in church mentioned our Diamond wedding and asked me all about it during the service, and then everyone clapped! Fantastic! We were even mentioned at the church service at Exton, i.e. "the Canadian who married the day before D - Day!"

Our anniversary was such a wonderful occasion, the sun shone, everyone was happy and it was just perfect.
















